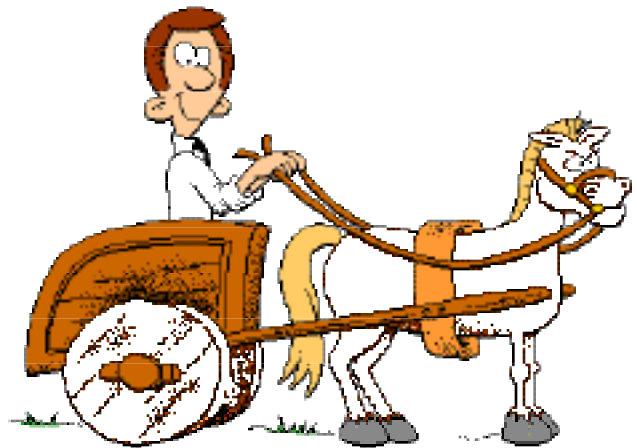

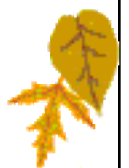

WOLVES

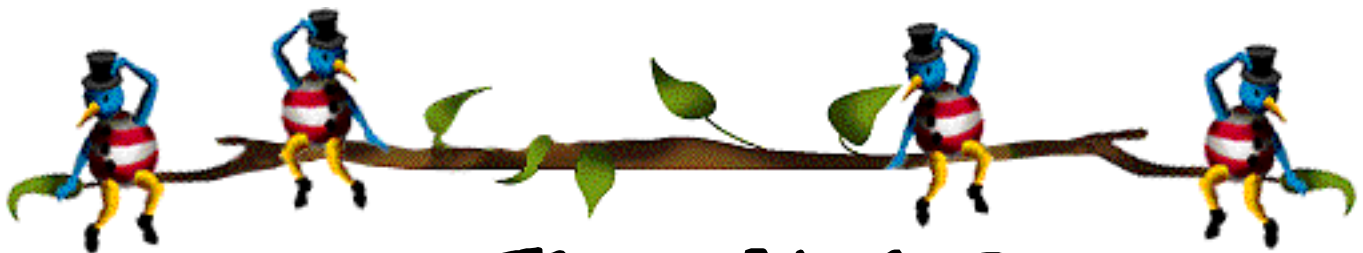

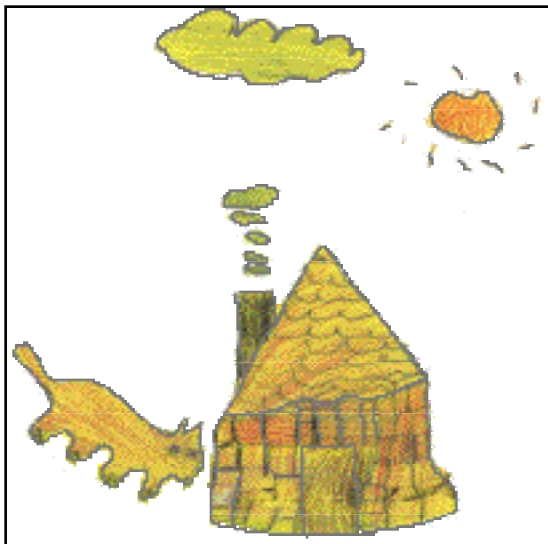

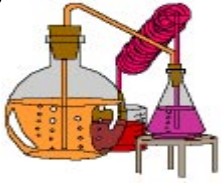

John F. Kennedy

John F. Kennedy was born on May 29, 1917 in Brooklyn, Massachusetts. For his education, he went to Harvard University. JFK served in the U.S Navy. One day Kennedy said, "Ask not what your country can do for you, but ask what you can do for your

country." All the people were glad to hear that. All the people were happy to see Kennedy running for president. Kennedy wanted to become president. The Vice President was Lyndon B. Johnson. Kennedy's nick name was "JFK." Kennedy married Jacqueline Lee Bouvier. Kennedy and Jacqueline had three children. Their names were Caroline, John Jr. and Patrick.

John F. Kennedy was the 35th President of the USA. He was president from 1960 to 1963. He was the youngest man ever elected president. John F. Kennedy had been remembered for the hope he brought to the nation. In 1961, the United States was threatened by the Cold War and racial injustice. At home, the new President admitted these problems in his inaugural address, but he also spoke for hope for a new generation. Kennedy's

major foreign policy concerned the Cold War with the Soviet Union. All over the world, Kennedy watched for signs of Soviet expansionism. When Eisenhower left his office, he told Kennedy that the CIA was secretly training Cuban exiles to fight Fidel Castro. Castro had a successful revolution in 1959. Cuba had become too friendly with the Soviet Union and the USA was worried. The idea of having a Soviet friend so close to the Florida shore made most Americans nervous.

Kennedy allowed a lot of spending to continue the Space Race. In a speech made soon after his inauguration, JFK vowed that the United States would land a man on the moon before the end of the decade. He said, "We choose not to go to the moon because it is easy, but because it is hard." In April 1961, Cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin (a Russian) became the first man to orbit the planet. Three weeks later; however, the U.S. Project Mercury launched U.S. Astronaut Alan Shepherd into space.

The Civil Rights movement during Kennedy's years in office advanced in its struggle for equality. In 1960, there was a first sit-in protest for racial equality. Two years later, James Medith became the first black man to enroll at the University of Mississippi. One of the decade's most moving moments came in August 1963 when Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his "*I Have a Dream*" speech. He made his speech in front of some 250,000 people during the *March on Washington, D.C.* In 1963, a man shot John F. Kennedy. JFK died on November 22, 1963.

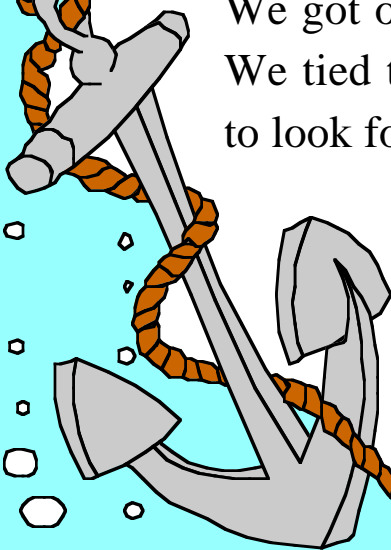

We stopped at the closest island for food because Eric was eating all of it. Then, I suspected something as I came to a tree. Food was hanging from it.

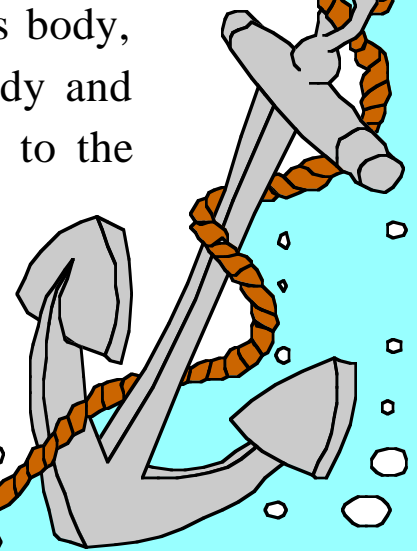

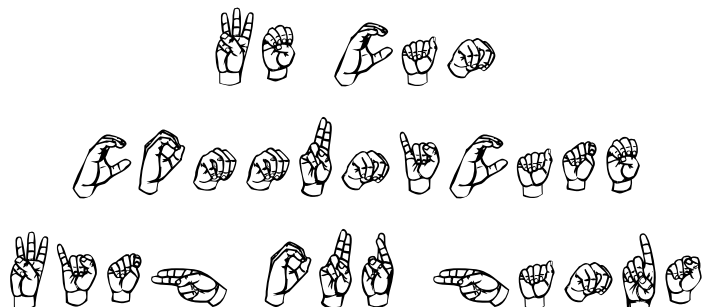
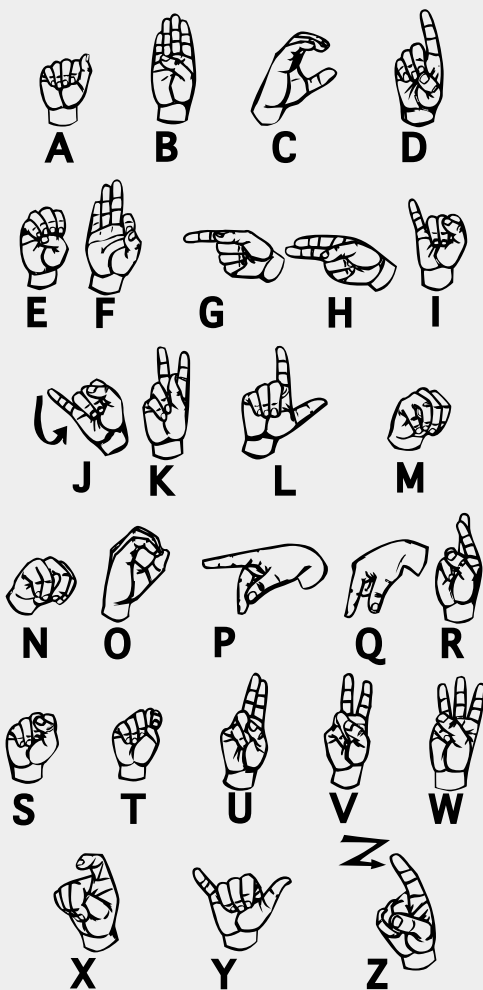
We started heading back home. I saw the island a couple of yards away. All of a sudden, the ship started to rock. I turned

When women are having babies, some of the older women help them during the delivery. If men are around, they are told to boil water because the women do not want men to be around during the labor. They have to leave and mind their own business.

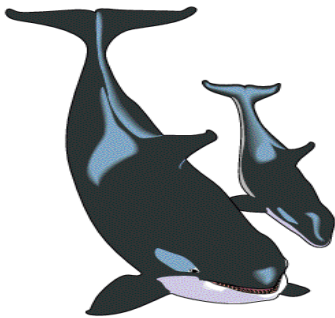
Malibu Lagoon
